Dear Presidents & Provosts,

The course content review process has been a significant undertaking, and your leadership and engagement have been critical to its success.

I also want to recognize your deans, department chairs, and faculty. The level of professionalism and academic rigor demonstrated throughout this process reflects the very best of the Texas Tech University System. This was not a small task—it required thoughtful review, collaboration, and a shared commitment.

The [enclosed memorandum](#) outlines the framework and standards developed through this work and positions our system for long-term strength.

Across more than 14,000 courses offered systemwide this semester, 1,403 courses with potentially applicable content were identified for further review or clarification. Of those, just 92 courses were submitted for formal review, while 324 courses were disclosed as required for professional licensure, certification, or patient care. The Academic, Clinical, and Student Affairs Committee of the Board of Regents has completed its review of the initial 92 submitted courses, and less than 60 courses resulted in recommended modifications.

The data is clear, and the results speak for themselves.

They reflect a deliberate, disciplined process—not a sweeping overhaul. They demonstrate that our classrooms are already aligned with our core mission and that only a very small percentage of courses require modification.

At the same time, this effort underscores something larger: the Texas Tech University System is not waiting to be told what compliance looks like—we are defining it for the rest of the state and the nation.

We have taken a comprehensive, system-wide approach to ensure that our academic offerings are aligned with state and federal law, board guidance, and the expectations placed on a public, taxpayer-supported university system.

This work is about ensuring that every course we offer is rigorous, relevant, and directly tied to preparing students for success in a 21st-century workforce. It is about reinforcing the integrity of our curriculum, strengthening public trust, and maintaining our competitiveness as institutions of higher education.

As our system continues to grow in enrollment, reputation, research, and impact, it is incumbent upon all of us to ensure that our policies, practices, and academic offerings reflect that momentum. The steps outlined in the accompanying memorandum are designed to do exactly that: provide clarity, consistency, and a strong framework for the future.

This was a significant undertaking, and your leadership made it possible. More importantly, it sets a strong foundation for what comes next.

The Texas Tech University System remains focused on our core mission—education, research and innovation—and we are leading with discipline, purpose, and an unwavering focus on student outcomes.

Thank you again for your partnership and for the work you continue to do every day on behalf of our students and our state.
