OUR HISTORY AND SHARED MISSIONS

Texas Tech University System [Administration]

Formed in 1996. Formally established by the State of Texas in 1999.

The mission of the Texas Tech University System is to provide leadership and support services for Texas Tech University, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, Angelo State University, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso and Midwestern State University in the fulfillment of each component institution's individual mission.

Texas Tech University

Founded in 1923. Joined the TTU System as Charter Member in 1996.

As a public research university, Texas Tech University advances knowledge through innovative and creative teaching, research and scholarship. The university is dedicated to student success by preparing learners to be ethical leaders for a diverse and globally competitive workforce. The university is committed to enhancing the cultural and economic development of the state, nation and world.

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center

Founded in 1969. Joined the TTU System as Charter Member in 1996.

As a comprehensive health sciences center, TTUHSC's mission is to enrich the lives of others by educating students to become collaborative health care professionals, providing excellent patient care and advancing knowledge through innovative research.

Angelo State University

Founded in 1928. Joined the TTU System in 2007.

Angelo State University provides highly competitive graduates to the global marketplace by delivering quality programs in a values-focused and student-centered teaching and learning environment.

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso

Established in 2013 after being a regional campus since 1969. Joined the TTU System in 2013.

The mission of TTUHSC El Paso is to improve the lives of people in our state and community by focusing on the unique health care needs of socially and culturally diverse border populations through excellence in integrated education, research and patient care.

Midwestern State University

Founded in 1922. Joined the TTU System in 2021.

Midwestern State University is a leading public, liberal arts university committed to providing students with rigorous undergraduate and graduate education in the liberal arts and professions. Through an emphasis on teaching, augmented by the opportunity for students to engage in research and creative activities alongside faculty and to participate in co-curricular and service programs, MSU Texas prepares its graduates to embark upon their careers or pursue advanced study. The university's undergraduate education is based upon a comprehensive arts and sciences core curriculum. The understanding that students gain of themselves, others and the social and natural world prepares them to contribute constructively to society through their work and private lives.

HOW THE TTU SYSTEM WORKS

The Texas Tech University System is governed, controlled and directed by a 10-member <u>Board of</u> <u>Regents</u> (including one student regent) appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Texas Legislature. The Board of Regents is guided by the <u>Regents' Rules and Regulations</u> and upholds the <u>System Regulations</u> and operating policies of each member institution.

<u>Chancellor Tedd L. Mitchell, M.D.</u>, serves as the CEO of the TTU System, a position appointed by the Board of Regents. Dr. Mitchell works collaboratively with the Board of Regents, the <u>TTU System Administration</u> <u>Executive Leadership Team</u> and <u>university presidents</u> to enhance the System's profile and support the shared missions of advancing higher education, health care, research and community engagement.

Each of the five institutions has a president who is appointed by the chancellor and Board of Regents, serves as CEO of the university and is responsible for its strategic operation.

THE ROLE OF THE TTU SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION

Fostering a culture of collaboration, sustainability and excellence, the <u>TTU System Administration</u> provides its component institutions with leadership and services that support the fulfillment of each component university's mission. The functions performed by the TTU System Administration and coordinated between the component institutions are identified with intention to maximize consolidated expertise, leverage cost-saving measures and be force multipliers in advancing our collective impact.

In addition to providing specific services through a servant leadership approach, the TTU System Administration provides individuality for the component institutions while ensuring the overall fiscal health and stability of the system and supporting strategic initiatives of each university.
