As vice chancellor and general counsel, Bentley oversees a wide variety of legal matters including, litigation, employment matters, health care compliance, medical malpractice claims, student discipline issues, open records, policy matters, constitutional law issues, athletics, law enforcement, real estate, construction matters and contracts. Bentley arrived at the TTU System following a 15-year career in the Office of the General Counsel at the University of Houston where he most recently served as senior associate general counsel. He received a Juris Doctor degree from the University of Houston Law Center, his master's degree in sports management from the United States Sports Academy and a bachelor's degree from Hawaii Pacific University. Bentley is a former college baseball student-athlete who was on a baseball scholarship at the University of Utah and Hawaii Pacific University and has published multiple articles in the areas of sports law. Bentley has also taught undergraduate courses in sports law and currently teaches a higher education law class at the Texas Tech University School of Law. In this role, Breedlove managed the contracting process, provided quality assurance reviews during project development phases, offered support for quality control inspections and promoted job site safety and health and warranty management, while also maintaining the FP&C Design and Building Standards for all TTU System projects. He brings more than 35 years of experience to his position following more than 12 years in the fire protection industry and more than 13 years managing agricultural processing facilities. In addition to his role at the TTU System, Breedlove serves on the Board of Directors for Carillon Senior Living Center. A Lubbock native and graduate of Texas Tech University, he earned a bachelor's degree in construction engineering technology in 1986. MARTHA BROWN

Martha Brown has served as the vice chancellor for state relations for the Texas Tech University System since August 2019. Prior to that she served as vice chancellor for governmental relations, associate vice president of governmental relations and assistant vice president of public affairs. After graduating from Texas Tech University School of Law in May 1979, Brown practiced in a general practice law firm in Lubbock, Thompson and Thomas, until January of 1984 when she accepted the position in Public Affairs at TTU. At the time, the office was a shared service between the university and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. Eventually, the TTU System was created in August 1996 and the Office of Governmental Relations was established. Brown worked with Mike Sanders representing TTU and TTUHSC in the State Legislature and several state and legislative agencies. The system grew to include three additional component institutions, including Angelo State University (joined in 2007), Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso (established in 2013), and Midwestern State University (joined in 2021). Brown worked closely with and supported all five of the TTU System chancellors and 27 presidents. She holds a Bachelor of Business Administration from TTU along with her Doctor of Jurisprudence from the School of Law. TTU is 101 years old this year, and Brown has been associated with Texas Tech for 51 of those years.

Griffin is President and CEO of The Griffin Companies and Pro Petroleum Inc., which are wholesale fuel marketing, distribution and storage companies. He previously served as a TTU System Regent from 2005-09. He is a member of the Texas Economic Development Corporation Board of Directors, State Bar of Texas and the Lubbock County Bar Association, director of the Lubbock Economic Development Alliance, and former director of Plains Capital Bank. Ginger Kerrick Davis was appointed by Gov. Greg Abbott to the Board of Regents of the Texas Tech University System on March 6, 2019. She was named vice chairwoman of the board on Nov. 17, 2022, where she was nominated and affirmed by a unanimous vote by the board. She currently serves as the chairwoman of the Academic, Clinical and Student Affairs Committee. She also is a member of the Regents' Rules Review Committee. She has previously served the board as a member of the Academic, Clinical and Student Affairs Committee and as a member of the Audit Committee. Kerrick Davis is the chief strategy officer for Barrios Technology, Ltd. She retired from NASA in September 2021 after 30 years of service. She served in numerous leadership roles for NASA, including flight operations assistant director for the International Space Station, flight integration division chief and deputy director of the exploration integration and science directorate. Kerrick Davis became the first female Hispanic flight director in the history of NASA in 2005. In 2001, she was selected as the first non-astronaut capcom (short for Capsule Communicator), the person in Mission Control that speaks to the on-orbit crew. She served as NASA's first Russian Training Integration instructor in 1997, providing support to the first crew that would live onboard the ISS. She began working for NASA as a summer intern in 1991 for Johnson Space Center and started her first permanent assignment in May 1994 as a materials research engineer. In 1995, she was reassigned to the Mission Operations Directorate as an instructor for the ISS Environmental and Life Support System, training both astronauts and flight controllers. In 2016, Kerrick Davis was one of five women named to the Texas Women's Hall of Fame. Kerrick Davis and her husband, Samuel Davis, were married in March 2021. Kerrick Davis received a Bachelor of Science in physics in 1991 and a Master of Science in physics in 1993 from Texas Tech University. She was born and raised in El Paso, Texas.



JAMES MAULDIN

Vice Chancellor and Chief Financial Officer

Prior to joining the Texas Tech University System, James Mauldin served as vice president of treasury management for the Dallas Fort Worth International Airport where he was responsible for the defined benefit and defined contribution pension, debt portfolio, grants, banking and investments operations. His team led eight bond issues totaling more than \$5 billion during the COVID-19 pandemic and implemented a commercial paper program for the airport, which ranked as the No. 2 busiest airport in the world in 2021 with more than 62 million passengers. He served in a critical leadership role during his four-year tenure at the University of North Texas System as associate vice chancellor for treasury and later in the interim CFO position. His notable contributions include centralizing key functions for the university system, generating incremental investment returns and implementing a strategic capital planning model. From 2008 to 2015, Mauldin served a pair of municipalities as the director of finance/CFO at the City of Cedar Hill – a suburb in Dallas County – and as treasurer and assistant director of finance for the City of Fort Worth, which is the county seat in Tarrant County.

Dr. Tedd L. Mitchell is the fifth chancellor and CEO of the Texas Tech University System, a nearly \$3 billion, higher-education enterprise consisting of five distinct and distinguished universities. The system enrolls over 63,000 students, employs approximately 21,000 people and operates at 24 academic locations across Texas and internationally. It has nearly 400,000 alumni and an endowment valued at more than \$1.7 billion. Mitchell works collaboratively with the Board of Regents, the System Administration and university presidents to enhance the system's profile and support the shared missions of developing people and advancing tomorrow through higher education, health care, research and community outreach. He guides the system's engagement with elected officials in Austin and federal leaders in Washington, D.C., to further increase funding and support. Under his leadership, the TTU System has achieved record systemwide enrollment and fundraising; added MSU Texas as its fifth university; established the state's first new veterinary medicine school in 100 years and its first new dental medicine school in over 50 years; and sees monumental success during each legislative session, including significant funding to support strategic institutional initiatives. A Longview native, Mitchell earned his bachelor's degree from Stephen F. Austin State University and his medical degree from the University of Texas Medical Branch.



SCOTT PARSONS

Scott Parsons serves as the assistant vice chancellor for Leader & Culture Development for the Texas Tech University System, beginning the role on Aug. 31, 2023. In his position, Parsons assists organizations in developing leaders of character by designing curricula, integration techniques and assessment tools with a focus on character education. He also works with leaders at all the universities in the TTU System to implement a values-based culture. Prior to his position at the TTU System, Parsons served as an officer in the U.S. Army and has over 24 years of military experience through his position in cyber and military intelligence and as an assistant professor of philosophy and ethics at the United States Military Academy at West Point. Parsons also served as the Character Development Integrator for the Military Program at West Point for three years and completed three combat deployments to Iraq, one to Afghanistan, and a one-year tour of duty in the Republic of Korea (South Korea). Parsons earned his doctorate through the Jubilee Centre for Character and Virtues at the University of Birmingham, United Kingdom. He earned two master's degrees in philosophy and political science from Columbia University, a bachelor's degree in education from the University of Nebraska Omaha and a bachelor's degree in philosophy from the University of Texas at San Antonio. Kim Turner, CPA, has served as the chief audit executive for the Texas Tech University System since 2004. With over 34 years of audit experience, she leads a team of 17 auditors with responsibility for the audit activities of the System and its five universities. In addition, Turner is a dedicated practitioner and proponent of the TTU System Administration values culture and served as its first executive sponsor. With a long history of service in professional and philanthropic organizations, she currently serves on the boards of Covenant Health System and Texas Tech Credit Union. She was the founding president of the High Plains Chapter of The Institute of Internal Auditors and was president of the Association of College & University Auditors (ACUA), an international association of higher education institutions. Turner received ACUA's two highest awards: Outstanding Professional Contributions and Excellence in Service. She has led or participated in over a dozen peer review teams to elevate and highlight the value of internal audit functions both inside and outside of higher education. She also serves as a frequent speaker on topics ranging from fraud and ethics to leadership of high-performing audit functions. 


